Mayor Stevenson, the youngest Mayor in Salt Lake County, has 10 years of community engagement experience and recently learned that UDOH ranks Midvale 84th out of 99 on their Utah Health Improvement index. Mayor Stevenson has community engagement experience and special interest in improving health disparities and was referred by Tom Hudachko. This appointment would be for one 3-year term from July 1, 2022 - June 30, 2025. County-wide appointment: Mayor Michael Weichers- is the Mayor with the City of Cottonwood Heights who resides in Cottonwood Heights, Council District #4. He is proven leader with 20+ years management experience and is a current Vice President, Senior Relationship Advisor with Zion's Bank. Susie Petheram, Sr. Planner, FFKR Architects (Urban Design, Urban Planning)</p>	<p>The Salt Lake County Housing Trust Fund Advisory Board (HTFAB) has nine (9) vacant board positions. We have been recruiting members for several weeks and eight (8) candidates have submitted applications through the SLCo Boards & Commissions portal. The mayor has reviewed the list of candidates and has authorized the Office of Regional Development to schedule time on the Council Work Session agenda to present the slate of nominees for an advice and consent vote. We are requesting a time certain on the agenda for the August 16 Council Work Session. As outlined in Salt Lake County Code Chapter 2.91, at least six of the HTFAB advisory board members are required to have expertise or experience in specific subject matter areas, including: urban design, public asset management, architecture, urban planning, housing services/development, and economics. In addition, at least two members who qualify for affordable or special needs housing benefits (lived experience).</p>

<p>3.6</p>	<p>Funding to Complete a Reroute of the Jacob's Ladder Trail in Unincorporated Salt Lake County</p>	<p>The Mayor's Administration is asking the Council to consider an urgent funding request from the Salt Lake Climber's Alliance for the Jacob's Ladder Trail Project located in unincorporated Salt Lake County to help complete a reroute of the current trail. The project will have a 4,000 foot trail shortfall without an immediate influx of \$38,000. The funding shortfall is due to a National Forest Foundation Grant that was not funded, as well as budget increases on account of unanticipated complexities of the project. The project area is three hours from the trailhead and is situated on steep technical terrain. As a result, more rock work has been required than what was initially anticipated. The trail's destination is the summit of Lone Peak (11,260 feet), gaining 5,600 feet of elevation over six miles from the Peak View Trailhead. The most challenging part of this approach is this middle section, where 1.3 miles of a section known as (upper) Jacobs Ladder gains 2,200 feet, with an average grade of 32%. To improve the recreation experience of hikers and climbers and to protect the resource, the Salt Lake Climbers Alliance began construction on a three-mile reroute in the fall of 2021 after years of planning. This new segment will switch back across the slope rather than climbing directly up it. The Salt Lake Climbers Alliance has raised over \$120,000 to complete this project but remains \$38,000 short as of today, resulting in 4,000 ft of trail left to complete. If funding cannot be secured, the new alignment will tie back into the old trail site. Currently, work crews are camping overnight to complete the trail. If the trail is not completed at this time, there will not be enough scope to get another crew up to complete the trail. This last push will require a few more weeks of work, and then the project will be complete. <p>4.1</p>	<p>Behavioral Health Services Advisory Council Appointment</p> <p>Siamak Khadjenoury, District 6</p>	<p>The Behavioral Health Services Advisory Council (BHSAC) has three (3) vacant council position and has been accepting applications for the past several months. We received an application from Siamak Khadjenoury in February 2022 and invited him to attend the April 6, 2022 BHSAC meeting to discuss his interest in the vacant position and share his relevant experience and qualifications that may be complementary to the efforts of the BHSAC. A motion was made during the April 6th meeting to proceed with submitting Siamak's application to the Mayor and County Council for review and consideration for an official appointment with the BHSAC. The current BHSAC members voted in unanimous support of the motion to request consideration for Siamak Khadjenoury to become an appointed member of the BHSAC. Siamak Khadjenoury is an Iraqi immigrant who reports he has "personal ties within the Middle Eastern, Jewish, and Indigenous communities in the area." He has a vast amount of experience in the behavioral health field, including having been the CEO of several local behavioral health organizations and psychiatric hospitals. Siamak is currently the CEO of Altium Health, which is an organization dedicated to removing barriers from those seeking treatment for mental health and addictions. Siamak ran for Utah House of Representatives in 2020 and per his report, "has a great understanding and appreciation for the legislative process." Mr. Khadjenoury has a wealth of experience in the behavioral health field, he has a unique and invaluable perspective on diverse and often underserved populations in Salt Lake County, and he has a firm understanding of the political and legislative processes involved in behavioral healthcare in Utah. The current BHSAC members feel that Siamak Khadjenoury's personal and professional background and experience will complement the ongoing efforts of the BHSAC</p>
