Meeting Convened at noon (lunch provided)

Welcome and Introductions

David Litvack welcomed everyone and excused Mayor Ben McAdams who will not be attending the meeting. He then asked for introductions.

Approval of Minutes

- Approval of the August 13, 2014 CJAC meeting minutes was tabled until the next CJAC Full Committee meeting because a quorum was not present.

ATI Report

- Jeannie Edens explained the Behavioral Health Alternatives to Incarceration: Results (copy of report attached to original minutes).
- The Alternatives to Incarceration initiative include the following:
 - Jail Diversion Outreach Team (JDOT).
 - Co-Occurring Reentry & Empowerment (CORE).
 - Community Response Team (CRT).
 - ATI Transportation.
- The study shows both CORE and JDOT have had a clear positive impact. ATI Transport and CRT have had a slight reduction in numbers and are currently being analyzed.
- Discussion followed about the impact of housing.
- Jeannie talked about the Criminal Justice Primer on Access to Healthcare conference to be held at the State Office Building on December 3rd (copy of information and agenda attached to original minutes). Contact Jeannie for registration.

Project & Initiative Update

- David Litvack gave an update on the CSG Partnership and current efforts which include:
 - The County system analysis.
 - A Performance Measures Dashboard report with 5 to 10 data items. A draft report is being developed for presentation to the CJAC committee in January.
 - The State Justice Reinvestment Initiative is working with PEW to ascertain what new initiatives may be available.
- R.I.S.E. (Reentry through Integrated Services & Social Enterprise) (aka Better Futures)
 - The CJAC recommendation has been given to the Mayor and the recommendation is now with County Council for approval.
- IJIS
 - The data is being gathered and compiled into a data analysis report.
 - There will be a Dashboard Report for ECR.
 - The Palantir Portal is progressing and a report should be completed for presentation to CJAC at the December meeting.

CJAC 2015 Budget Request

- The 2015 CJAC Budget Request has been sent to the Mayor and all budget request items are part of the Mayor's budget request to Council.

2015 CJAC Proposed Calendar

- David Litvack talked about the CJAC meeting schedule for 2015 (copy attached to original minutes). The meetings will continue to be the second Wednesday of the month at 12:00 noon. Room N2003 will be scheduled for the meetings but the location may have to be changed on occasion.

Other Business

- Judge McCullagh said there has been a change to the Probable Cause and Bail Setting time period rule. The rule changes the time period from 48 hours to 24 hours. Meetings are currently being held to discuss the changes and impact.
- Max Burdick commented on the current legislative proposal to change some drug possession charge classifications from felony to misdemeanor. David will provide a copy of CCJJ's final recommendations to the CJAC committee.

With no further business, the meeting adjourned at 1:30 p.m.

Meeting Convened at noon (lunch provided)

Welcome and Introductions

Carlton Christensen welcomed everyone and excused Mayor Ben McAdams who will not be attending the meeting. He then asked for introductions.

Approval of Minutes

- Approval requested of the January 8, 2014 and April 9, 2014 Full CJAC Committee meeting minutes. MOTION to approve by Judge Royal Hansen, seconded by Mayor JoAnn Seghini. **MOTION** approved.

Behavioral Health Alternatives to Incarceration: RESULTS

(7/1/12 to 6/30/14)

What are Alternatives to Incarceration Programs (ATI)?

Programs designed to reduce use of the criminal justice system for those with serious mental illness or co-occurring mental illness and substance use disorders to improve opportunities for these individuals.

- Jail Diversion Outreach Team (JDOT)—an assertive community outreach team offering a 1:10 staff/patient ratio and 24/7 availability.
- Co-Occurring Reentry & Empowerment (CORE) – This team serves adult male criminal offenders with co-occurring disorders in a 16-bed facility providing wrap-around services on site and in the community.
- Community Response Team (CRT)—The team reaches into the jail to support inmates with serious and persistent mental illness to provide resources, advocacy and support in discharge planning. Services are coordinated across an array of agencies to support the consumer.
- ATI Transportation: Valley Mental Health picks up SPMI inmates released from the jail at a specific time and transports them to a community-based treatment provider for assessment and services.

What are we working to achieve?

- Reduced criminal activity and involvement with the criminal justice system
- Increased participation in housing
- Increased participation in behavioral health treatment for those needing it.

Study Design

The outcomes data presented follow the group who participated in services in FY2012 (July 1, 2011-June 30, 2012). The results are presented and discussed as follows:

- **1 Year:** Comparing data 1 year prior to program enrollment and 1 year after program enrollment.
- **2 Years:** Comparing data 2 years prior to enrollment and 2 years after program enrollment

Because the ATI transport is a one-time/short-term involvement, the outcomes will focus on whether participants were engaged in treatment services 30 days after release from jail. Housing data show a comparison of housing at enrollment and at discharge from the program.

Outcomes combine data from individuals currently engaged in programs with those who have ended participation.

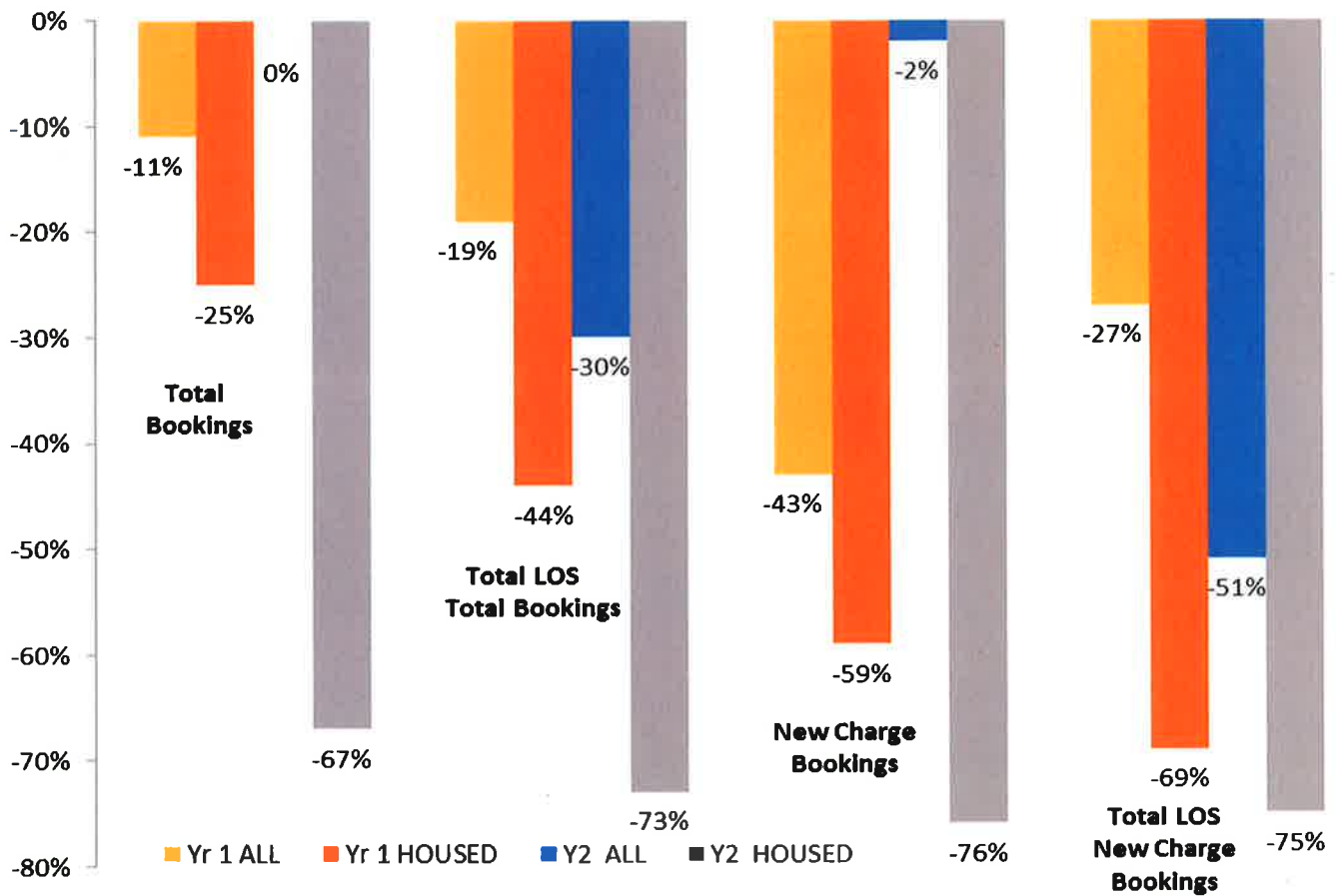
Total Bookings include those for probation violations, warrants, other administrative violations and new charge bookings. New Charge Bookings reflect bookings for new crimes.

Evidence of Success: CORE & JDOT

Both the CORE and JDOT programs have a clear positive impact in the two year period following engagement in services, including:

- reduced involvement with the jail
- reduced length of the time in jail
- reduced criminal activity
- increase in those newly housed

The results are presented below.

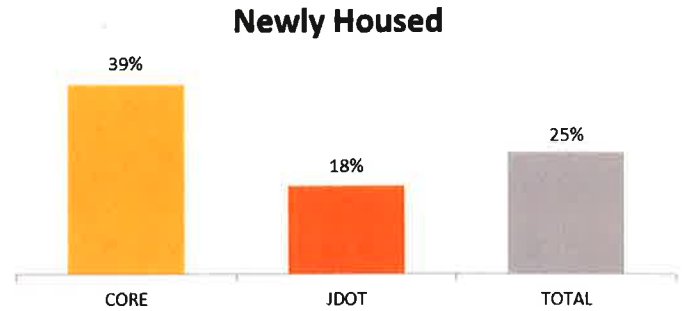


Reductions in the number of bookings were not as great in year two as they were in the first year. Analysis of the data show these results were primarily from a few participants who had a large number of new bookings. Only 7% of the new charge bookings were from people who continued their engagement in CORE or JDOT, the remaining 93% came from those who had ended participation. Therefore, most criminal activity occurs after leaving treatment. Both CORE and JDOT showed reductions in the percent of participants who had bookings before and after participation.

Participation in the County's Housing programs continues to show stronger results than for those not in County Housing options, indicating that housing increases the power of the Alternatives to Incarceration programs.

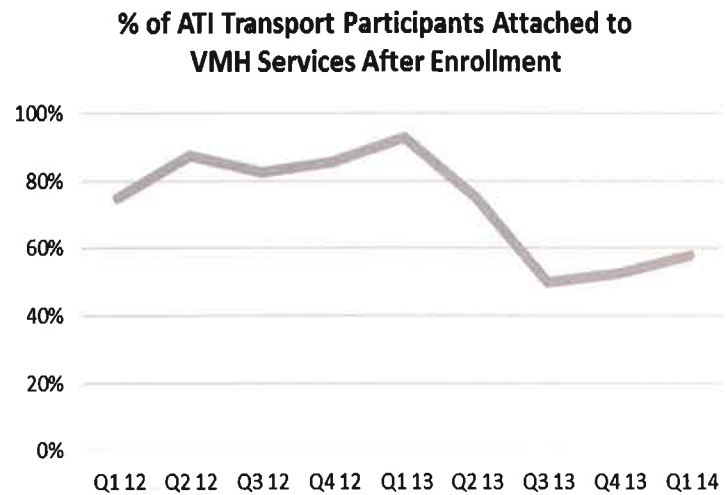
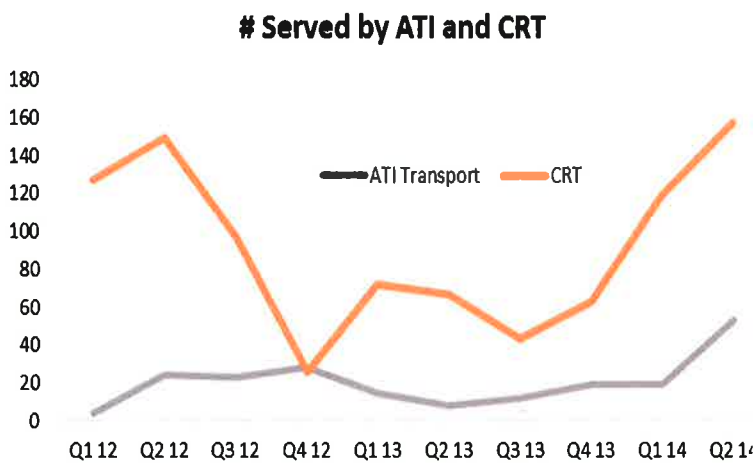
HOUSING

One quarter (25%) of people who were homeless prior to participation in CORE and JDOT now have housing.



Evidence of Success: ATI Transport & CRT

The total number of in-reach visits to the jail has varied significantly, ranging from 146 in 2012 to 26 later that year and increasing to its high of 157 in the 2014. ATI Transport experienced declines in Q2 of 2013 but then increased in early 2014. This increase stems from increasing the availability of services for the ATI transport clients so more could be served.



The ATI Transport program has seen reduced effectiveness at engaging people in service upon arriving at VMH Behavioral Health Services upon leaving incarceration. While the engagement rate is 75% since Q1 2012, it has been under 60% for the past 3 quarters. There was a small increase in the last quarter. Analysis is underway to determine the reasons for the reduced numbers.

Additional Data

The table below provides overall information for JDOT and CORE clients during the two time periods. It outlines information on total bookings, new charge bookings, and length-of-stay for each.
